At the beginning of the school year, students WILL BE EVALUATED on the novels they have read through different assessments. Your responses may be typed or handwritten neatly on loose-leaf paper and ready to turn in by August 26th, 2022.

It is important that students read each novel carefully, highlight/underline, take notes/outline, and try to reach the deepest understanding of the characters, plot, symbolism, metaphors, and themes contained in the TWO books they read.

Assignment(s)

- 1. In a well-developed paragraph, discuss the main conflict of the novel. Is the conflict internal or external? Cite evidence to prove your points and be specific. Avoid plot summary.
- 2. Oftentimes, a novel contains more than one theme. Write a paragraph explaining one of the novel's overarching themes. Use evidence to support your points.
- 3. Create an advice column (Dear Abby) and give the character(s) in the story advice on how to handle his/her problem.
- 4. Complete the following chart by choosing at least 4 quotations that are particularly poignant and/or meaningful.
